From Your Interim Moderator -

Over the last few years I've spent my Wednesday evenings going to music classes at Aberdeen University run by an organisation called SCAT – Scottish Culture and Traditions. I've always loved the sound of traditional folk music but it's a style I've never mastered, so I thought it'd be good to go along and learn a few new tunes and some different strumming styles. We had some musical friends up from Glasgow a while back and I was telling them about SCAT and playing a couple of the tunes I'd learned. Before I knew what was happening, someone had the fiddle out, someone else produced a recorder. The flute made an appearance, percussion came in the form of a cajon drum, a snare and hi-hat and a bodhran, a second guitar was dug out of the cupboard and soon we were rattling through these tunes I'd been learning on Wednesdays. Luckily for me the other musicians were 'proper' musicians who could sightread, unlike me who tends to learn things by ear. But we amazed ourselves not only by the sound we made (which was surprisingly good!) but by the fun we had while making it. Everybody messed up at times and nobody was an expert, but

overall we managed to carry the tunes pretty well. And those who couldn't play weren't excluded because they just got up and danced! It was the most fun, exhilarating time I can remember having in ages and there was a lesson in it for me, I think.

So often we soldier on alone, trying to do our best. But we weren't made to be solo artists. Life is an ensemble piece and we are immeasurably enriched by the gifts and talents of others. We can do far more together than we can apart.

How can we recapture that thinking in the church, I wonder? Seeing it not as an institution to join, but a community to belong to?

Those early Christian communities Paul wrote to in the New Testament would have numbered in their twenties and thirties of people. Everyone was known, no-one was anonymous. Everyone was invested, no-one was ambivalent. Everyone contributed to the life of the congregation, no-one opted out. I often wonder how the 'music' of church life would change if everyone on our books (who's fit and able) were willing to come along and genuinely get involved. Bringing their own skills and insights to the party, or at the very least, coming along and enjoying the craic. All of us have a role to play – not least in a time of vacancy, when more is needed and expected from our leadership and congregation.

When new folk join a congregation it's generally because they've begun to discern a bit of the 'music' that Christ's making in this place and want to come along and get involved. It's our hope and prayer that in the years ahead, we'll be able to draw more folk into the life of our churches, not for our sake but for theirs. Some will have forgotten the tunes and some may never have heard them, but it's wonderful how quickly you pick them up when you join the circle and start playing.
